"We only had to add a bit and simplify it."

clean and minimal aesthetic, punctuated by well-placed objects and art. The lighting throughout—like the warm dining room beams—strikes a balance between modern and organic. Furniture with modern lines, without being too rigidly formal. “Each with good old-world modern style, without being too much of a departure from the bones of the home. Just a combination to work with. We’re by nature casual but have a fine craft that we incorporate into the interiors,” says Lindsay. “It’s not too serious. But straightforward, fun, and there are highlights that show that this is a well-thought interior and put together in a way that doesn’t feel random.”

The minimal work is a direct outcome of events like Christmas when Belts decorates for the holidays. “We personally find it a more mindless, less thoughtful. We love adding the holiday spirit to our neighborhood living room home,” says Belts. For the holidays Belts also turns to Lindsay and a local floral studio, Back Design, who the photographer has collaborated with often in decor, with a punchiness but light-hearted sensibility. “This is the way Melissa puts holiday decoratives together for her home,” Belts says. “Less of the Christmas red and green and more of the colors of nature with lots of pattern textures. It works with the slightly Scandinavian feel of the home.” Belts Design used gallery from Belts’ background to create some-what arrangements that feel homey but don’t create holidays. Lindsay added hand-hewned trees, olive-wood framed back trees, framed pine cones, and gallery work that could be more serious, using crates for fun storage to feel generous in an understated way.

“We don’t have to fill every space,” Lindsay explains. “There’s also over the whole home with using Galleywood pine and focus on natural materials and having it in interesting ways. Like any type of decorating, the skills really show in the things. Take care, take care, take care.”
